SIDNIE WHITE CRAWFORD
Trinity Class of 1981
Doctor of Divinity

You, Sidnie White Crawford, have distinguished yourself as a first-rate educator and an internationally recognized scholar. There are few around the world who possess your credentials in biblical studies and archaeology, and through your lifelong commitment to teaching, we have more clearly discovered our human history—equitably and passionately.

As a student at Trinity, you majored in religion and music, graduating Phi Beta Kappa and with honors. Your pursuit of education continued, and in 1984, you completed a master of theological studies degree from Harvard Divinity School. Four years later, you received a Ph.D., with distinction, from Harvard University, where you studied under world-renowned biblical scholar Frank Moore Cross.

It is at Harvard that your career in higher education began, prior to teaching at St. Olaf College and then, from 1989 to 1997, at Albright College, where you served as an assistant and then associate professor of religious studies. In 1997, you joined the faculty at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, where you remain the Willa Cather Professor of Hebrew Bible and Second Temple Judaism, Emerita. You also serve as a visiting scholar in the Department of Biblical Studies at Princeton Theological Seminary.

Through your distinguished career, you have become a foremost authority in the specialized areas of the Dead Sea Scrolls, the history and literature of Second Temple Judaism, and textual criticism of the Hebrew Bible/Old Testament, as well as the textual development of the Pentateuch, scribal traditions, and women in the biblical world. Your work has been groundbreaking in the interpretation of the Qumran texts, helping to inform how archaeology has affected the study and interpretation of the Bible.

As an author, your work has been published in the most well-respected journals of biblical literature. Among many other accomplishments, you have published critical editions of more than 10 Dead Sea Scroll manuscripts, as well as articles and books on the origins and identity of the Qumran community. You were a member of the international team responsible for the editio princeps of the Qumran Dead Sea Scrolls manuscripts. This first-ever printed edition of the manuscripts is considered to be a keystone in the history of archaeology, with great historical, religious, and linguistic significance that altered the world's understanding of biblical text development.

It was in 2019 that you published the book *Scribes and Scrolls at Qumran*, combining the conclusions of the first generation of scrolls scholars that have withstood the test of time while creating a new synthesis of text and archaeology that yields a convincing history of and purpose for the Qumran settlement. For authoring this book and supporting public understanding of the history and cultures from the earliest of times, you were selected for two prestigious honors: The Frank Moore Cross Award from the American School of Overseas Research and the Biblical Archaeology Society's Best Popular Book on Archaeology distinction. Your latest book is *The Text of the Pentateuch: Textual Criticism and the Dead Sea Scrolls*, which was published in 2022.

Well-known for your personal commitment to your craft, to the students you teach, and to the history you care for, you routinely offer your time and talent to committees that call upon your expertise. You have served as chair of the Board of Trustees of the W.F. Albright Institute of Archaeological Research in Jerusalem, the American headquarters for archaeological research in the Holy Land. You are a member of numerous editorial boards, including for Hermeneia, the updated edition of the New Revised Standard Version of the Bible, and The Hebrew Bible: A Critical Edition. And at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, you were the associate director of the Harris Center for Judaic Studies and a member of the Advisory Board for Women's and Gender Studies.

Since you last studied 'neath the elms, you have remained a well-connected supporter of Trinity. In recognition of your distinguished career in higher education and of devoting a lifetime of work to religious studies, I have the honor of presenting you, Sidnie White Crawford, for the degree of Doctor of Divinity, *honoris causa*.

NICOLE HOCKLEY

Doctor of Humane Letters

It is a promise made to transform tragedy into positive cultural change for a safer future and to take a public health, evidence-informed approach to address the epidemic of gun violence. This is your promise, Nicole Hockley. It is the Sandy Hook Promise.

Before December 14, 2012, you were an accomplished strategic marketing and communications professional for companies in the United States and the United Kingdom. But on that day, the course of your life changed forever when your 6-year-old son, Dylan, was killed by a gunman inside Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Connecticut, in one of the deadliest school shootings in U.S. history, a day former President Barack Obama calls the darkest of his presidency.

You chose to transform unspeakable grief and anguish into action, when one month later, in January 2013, you co-founded Sandy Hook Promise, a national nonprofit whose mission is to prevent violence in schools, homes, and communities. Today, as the nonprofit's chief executive officer, you have become a leading national voice on school safety and gun violence prevention, rising above the political divide to help ensure a brighter tomorrow.

Your intent is to honor all victims of gun violence by turning the Sandy Hook tragedy into a moment of transformation by offering programs and policies that protect young lives. Your leadership and advocacy have led to more than 18.5 million people participating in Sandy Hook Promise's lifesaving programs, averting countless acts of violence, with more than 3,270 mental health interventions, as well as 460 suicides prevented and at least 15 planned school attacks stopped. It is true that because of Sandy Hook Promise, communities are safer and policies are stronger.

As one of America's most well-respected thought leaders on the gun violence epidemic, you have presented several TEDx Talks; your opinion editorials have been published by *Newsweek*, CNN, *USA Today*, and *InStyle*; and your commentary has been featured on CNN, MSNBC, Newsy, ABC, CBS, Fox, and NBC, among countless other media outlets.

You have said that your Trinity experience, where you earned a B.A. in English and theater and dance and participated in countless extracurricular activities, has helped drive your successful career in marketing and now in your life's newest mission. There is evidence to support the claim. The award-winning public service announcement campaigns you helped co-create with BBDO New York have amassed hundreds of millions of views worldwide, including "Evan," which generated two billion impressions and 10 coveted Cannes Lions Awards, and "Back-to-School Essentials" and "Teenage Dream," each of which earned a prestigious Emmy Award for Outstanding Commercial, in 2019 and 2022, respectively.

You were honored by Trinity with its 2017 Alumni Achievement Award, with your citation noting your "courage, hard work, and selflessness." You also were recognized in 2016 by *People* magazine as one of its 25 Women Changing the World, though your motivation lies closer to home in caring for your surviving son, Jake, and through the work of Sandy Hook Promise.

In recognition of your solemn promise to honor your son Dylan and the 25 other lives taken on December 14, 2012, and of your lifesaving work to encourage and support solutions that create safer and healthier homes, schools, and communities, I have the honor of presenting you, Nicole Hockley, for the degree of Doctor of Humane Letters, *honoris causa*.

The Academic Regalia

In 1895, a commission of leading American educators established the Intercollegiate Code pertaining to the academic costume. The color of the lining of the hood is that of the college or university conferring the degree. The edging of the hood and the tassel of the cap indicate the subject to which the degree pertains, in accordance with the following official designations for colleges and universities in the United States:

The Owen Morgan Mace

The mace, which precedes the president in academic processions and is a symbol of executive powers, was presented to Trinity in 1950 in memory of Owen Morgan, Class of 1906, who served his alma mater as a member of the Board of Fellows, as a trustee, and as treasurer of the College. Historically, maces were first used as weapons in warfare and later became a symbol of the sovereign and his power. One of the first known uses of a mace by an educational institution was at Cambridge University in the 13th century. Today a number of colleges use the mace as a symbol of authority and of the power invested in the president by the faculty and trustees. The Morgan Mace is made of ebony, signifying endurance; bronze, meaning power; and gold, symbolizing dignity and glory. It is 44 inches long and weighs 20 pounds. The fluted staff represents the various components of an enduring education. It is bound by a gold ribbon, inscribed with the names of every Trinity president. On the head, or urn, of the mace are six seals of the sources of life and growth of this College: the Great Seal of the United States; the Seal of the State of Connecticut; the Charter Oak; the original seal of the City of Hartford; the Washington Coat of Arms; and the seal of the Episcopal Diocese of Connecticut. Surmounting the Gothic urn is the Trinity College seal crowned by an eagle about to take flight, symbolizing the freedom and power of an educated person.

The Presidential Collar

The collar, which is worn on ceremonial occasions, is the visible symbol of the president's high office and authority. The collar was presented to the College in 1953 by former President G. Keith Funston, Class of 1932, in memory of his grandmother, Maria Briggs Keith. The chain symbolically links modern higher education with the universities of yesteryear. The golden seal of the Trinity president hangs from the collar, which is fashioned of 20 replicas of the Trinity elms and seven silver seals: the six reproduced in the mace and the Trinity College seal superimposed on a triangle representing the religious foundations of the College crowned by a sun signifying enlightenment. In the lower corners of the triangle are the Book and a pair of student's hands extended to receive it, symbolizing the desire of youth to receive an education.

The Luther-Roosevelt Long Walk Inscription

The inscription on a stone in front of the Fuller Arch at Northam Towers commemorates the visit in June 1918 of former U.S. President Theodore Roosevelt, who delivered an address the day before Commencement and received an honorary degree at the ceremony.

The superstition holds that students who step on the stone may not graduate.

As the Commencement procession passes over the stone every year, graduating seniors make a point of deliberately stepping on it.

Taking the theme of his address from Old Testament scripture, Roosevelt commented on the emptiness of boasting and its prejudicial effect on the conduct of World War I. He cited a passage from 1 Kings 20:11, in which the King of Israel responds to a boasting warrior, “Let not him that girdeth on his harness boast himself as he that putteth it off.” The passage’s Latin translation is inscribed in the stone. Roosevelt indicated that, in his estimation, thoughtless exaggeration of Americans’ might had reinforced the German will to pursue the war. He reminded the approximately 5,000 people in the audience that much work remained to be done and that the country had to gear itself up for the supreme effort. Less than a month later, Roosevelt’s youngest son, Quentin, was shot down in aerial combat in France.
